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An Amazing Little Journey: From Bogus Basin to the Bahamas (almost) and Back Again

A recent set of NA activities on back-to-back weekends showed me how continuity and change both work in our lives in recovery.

Boise

The first leg of the adventure began in Boise, Idaho, for the 30th Annual Pacific Northwest (PNW) Convention. PNW is the second oldest convention in NA, behind only World. Boise is a gorgeous little town in the high desert, surrounded by mountains. It is usually one of the more sparsely attended PNWs, but this was well attended, and the convention actually ran out of merchandise.

I arrived early at 10:30am on Thursday, registered for my hotel room, and checked out the lay of the land. The hotel and convention facilities are by the Boise River, in a neighborhood called Garden City. It's called Garden City because it was the home of Chinese railroad workers who kept garden wherever they lived. The neighborhood now is a familiar one of tattoo parlors, massage parlors, and check cashing storefronts. It wasn't a garden, let's put it that way.

As the day wore on, I was joined by a lot of people from California. I went out to eat at a restaurant and was friendly with a local food server. She said there was another convention in town at the same time, and "I hope you're nicer than these guys." We tried.

Thursday night we went to a local meeting, which was well-attended with about 35-38 people, some in for the convention. All the locals were excited about the convention being in Boise. There was a clear NA message and we were welcomed warmly and invited to join them for dinner after the meeting.

Friday I got in a workout and went out to the airport to pick up more people, some from Seattle and some from NorCal. We used one of our familiar tactics for lunch, taking over a restaurant by getting the biggest table in the middle of the room. We enjoyed fellowshipping with each other, and also talking to the locals around us. One of our group was 7r years old, and he was tickled pink to hang out with us.

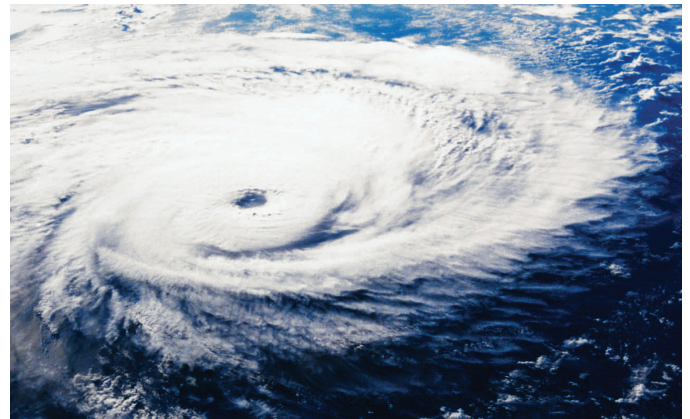
The convention began Friday afternoon, and the Friday night speaker was from Portland. The people at the convention were very warm, and the convention ran smoothly. One meeting focused on recovery at 30+, and the speakers had 35 and 45 years clean time respectively. They had a lot of experience and information about the history of NA and what it has been like to stay clean though all the changes in NA since the 60s.

Related to that, the amount of clean time at the convention was pretty overwhelming. When they did the countdown of years clean, there were people with 20+ years clean all throughout the meeting.

The only downer in the whole convention was the Sunday morning brunch. They tried to do individual portions instead of a big steamer table, and the eggs came out cold. Later, after the convention ended, we began driving people to the airport. We weren't going to leave until Monday afternoon, so we took

a trip to Bogus Basin (no lie!). Bogus Basin is up about 3,000 feet, and the fall colors of the aspen and birch were on full display.

I'm looking forward to going to PNW next year at SeaTac near the airport. It's very easy to get to, even drivable from NorCal (take snow tires or chains for the pass near the Oregon border), and inexpensive, in addition to it being a great place to experience recovery and fellowship.



Bahamas

The next weekend brought about an incredible sequence of events that began when I got a call inviting me to the Nassau, Bahamas NA Convention. Interestingly, the Bahamas are part of the Florida region.

Two of us were invited to take service commitments on Friday and Saturday night. I was glad to accept, and four people from California left to attend. Three of us – my sponsor, a friend, and myself – left on the same flight from Oakland to Seattle to change planes, then into Miami. We planned our schedule so we could get comfortable, rest, and hang out, then catch a 4:30 flight. The airport staff told us to check back in with them about 12:30 or 1:00, so we checked in and continued our airport food odyssey: we had already consumed fish tacos at SeaTac.

However, changes we brewing, starting with the weather. A tropical storm developed into Hurricane Noel. The airport staff notified us that our flight into the Bahamas had been cancelled. Since we try to live in the solution, we started calling our contacts to see what we could do. The message was discouraging. We were told it is bad, and we decided to let caution triumph. We held a group conscience in the airport to head back to California.

Now the problem became, "How do we do this?" We're in an airport that is the center of travel into and out of the Caribbean in the middle of a hurricane, chaos and disorder prevailed. In order to line up new flights, we had to go upstairs. At the Miami Airport, this entails leaving one security zone and having to pass security again. This was a nightmare, but we were helped by being in a special line. The staff helping us was really

not being pleasant.

We finally got back on the same flight we came in on at 4:30. This led us through Dallas and a three hour layover. So once again we were off to the food court, where we sat down and had an impromptu NA meeting. We discussed spiritual principles and reflected that we had not felt compelled to cuss out people in the midst of all the stress of travel under difficult conditions. We also began to wonder what was happening to our luggage throughout this convoluted journey. I don't know what the people in Dallas thought as three addicts in the restaurant were having this unusual conversation.

We finally got back into Oakland at 11:30pm, after spending 30 consecutive hours on airplanes and at airports. After deplaning we waited for our luggage – and waited – and waited. We checked in, and they reported our luggage was still in Miami. We were able to respond in a civilized manner, and began laughing hysterically at what all had gone “wrong.”

I arrived in Sonoma at 2:30am, 37 hours from door to door. The experience was exactly what it was supposed to be. We had made the effort, and felt good about that. We had had a great time in the process, and were happy to have found time to hang out with each other, only the outcome had changed.

But even though I practice spiritual principles in my affairs, next year I'm going to Hawaii, screw the Caribbean.

Yesterday vs. Today

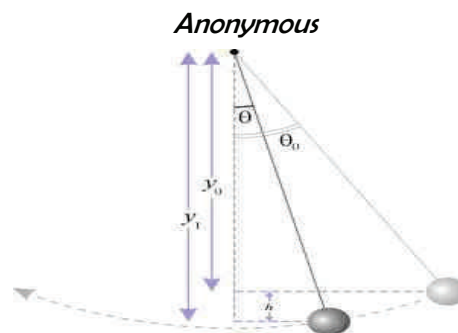
Yesterday shadow of doubt filled my mind,

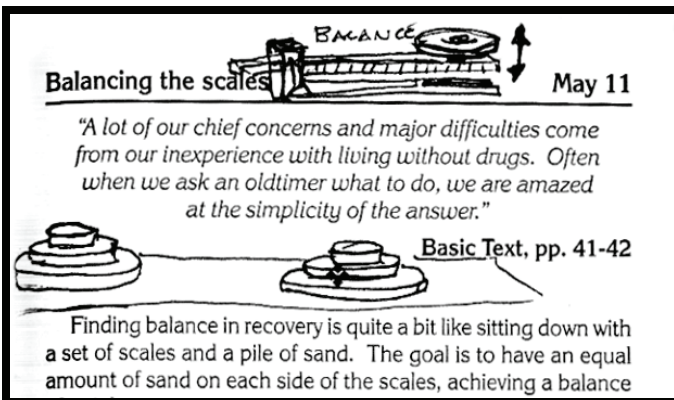

Unity Day 2007

I rolled in about 1pm, so I missed some of the early festivities, but still got a substantial taste of unity and fellowship.

As I crossed the parking lot toward the Veteran's Hall, I saw friends to greet. As I entered the hall, I got to see more people I know from doing area-level service. It created a strong sense of belonging in me to know people and be known – that's something to weigh when you consider the benefits of being in service.

As you walked in the front door, the t-shirt table was off to the right. It seemed like there was always a cluster of people hanging out and visiting every time I went by the table. But as friendly as that vibe was, it seemed like most of the Unity Day fun was happening in front of the building where smokers mingled with people enjoying the company of other addicts in the sunshine.

I did attend one meeting in the main hall, where various sub-committee representatives spoke about what each sub-committee does. While I was there, Barbara F was cracking up the meeting with comedic asides to her report.

I also worked for a while at the newsletter sub-committee table in the southern-most room of the building. Since my program of recovery is also about not eating addictively, I was able to resist the allure of the snacks being dished up in the little side snack bar, but the smell was very tempting.

I was bitterly disappointed that I didn't move early enough to nab a black XXL Big Wieners and Phat Buns t-shirt from the NAYC posse. The skull with barbeque implements was a classic, and I'm working a connection to line one up if they reprint a batch as promised.

It's always great to have people come by the table and get a sense of what newsletter content is or isn't important to people. The table was also a great place to people watch and appreciate the great diversity in our fellowship in our rural county.

A Gift of Recovery

The first weekend of November I went to Grass Valley, CA, to support Toby, a brother in recovery who was getting his six month chip. He has a story of strength and hope that even a hardhead like me had to be inspired by.

Originally, Toby was visiting Sonoma from Grass Valley on work. First, he showed me that wherever we go, we go to meetings. Second, shortly after that, he lost his fiancé in an auto wreck, they were both only four months into recovery. When that happened, this man did just what we talk about around here, he suited up and put one foot in front of the other. Not only did he not turn to drugs, he turned to the fellowship. He went to work to support his family and came to meetings and shared his pain, which is a gift money can't buy.

The story gets better! The morning I was leaving he called me and asked if I wanted to go to a convention in Reno, and I agreed. We got there just in time for the main speaker, Danny T., who was a riot. When we got to Reno, I was overwhelmed by the support Toby has in his area.

What was quite surprising was all the people I ran into from the Sonoma County area. I'd say I saw at least ten people I know by name and recognized at least 10 more, possibly from other areas I've visited.

After the convention, we went back to Grass Valley on Sunday for the chip meeting. They do it differently, and I like it. They have your sponsor or someone with a little more clean time present you to the group and present you your chip and then you say something about your recovery. So we mostly heard about people going to meetings, following suggestions, working the steps, and being of service. But a couple of people spoke about things like he hasn't been calling his sponsor much, he's not working the steps, but he goes to a lot of meetings and is managing to stay clean, and the group seems to give him a little extra love!

There was another lesson in it for me. I was hesitant to go to the convention because I didn't have the money to go. Toby said not to worry, he would cover me. It was very humbling to accept help from a newcomer, considering I have five years clean. But after accepting the gift, I realized that three people in recovery could have had their pleasure nipped in the bud if I would have let my pride get in the way.

So, once again, I get to learn to look beyond self, to better become a whole and well human being, and that gift just seems to keep growing.

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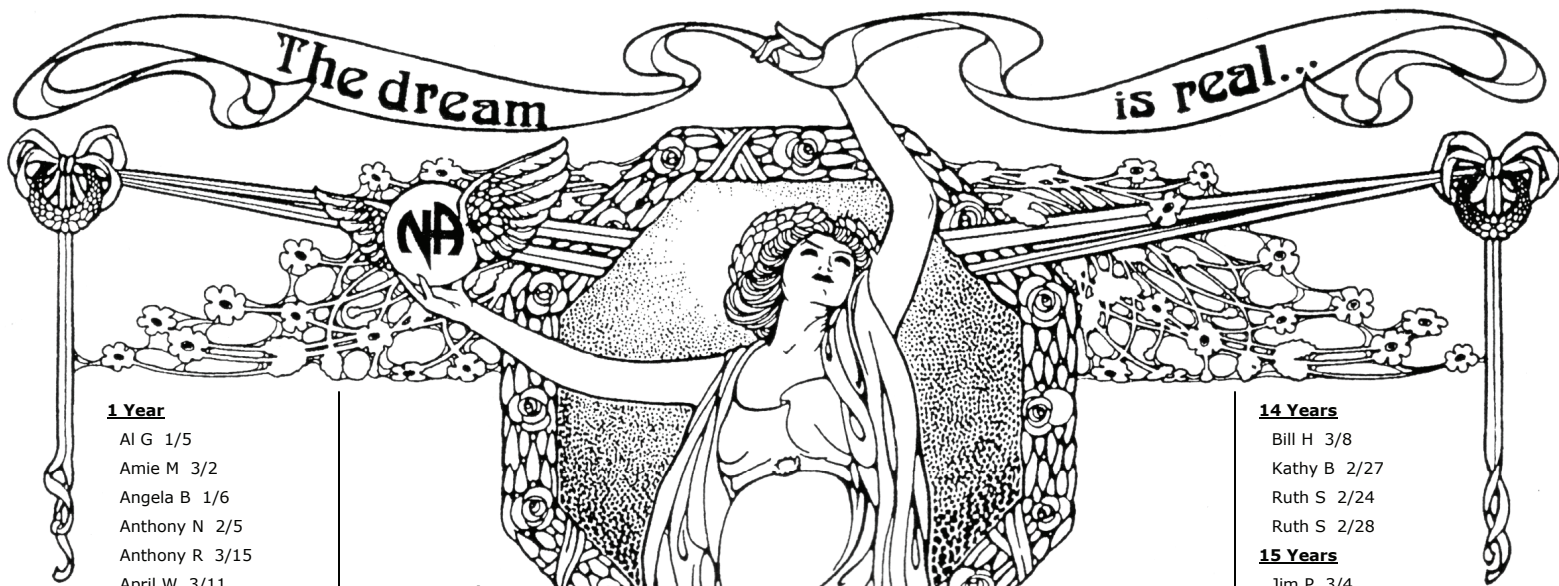
